Welcome from the directors

None of us will ever forget 2020, a year like no other. Despite the unprecedented challenges of the global pandemic, this has been an exciting year of resilience, growth and change here at People's Postcode Lottery.

This year reminded us in the starkest terms of our purpose. Never has the work of charities been more sorely needed, and the positive impact of our players' funding for thousands of good causes – large and small – been more keenly felt. In Britain and around the world, the Covid crisis brought hardship to communities, but our funded charities innovated and adapted to deal with soaring need, safe in the knowledge they had the funds to do so. A £3 million Postcode Recovery Fund was launched, through the Postcode Innovation Trust, to further support their response.

As the pandemic dragged on, we remained deeply grateful that player loyalty and the online subscription model meant our ticket sales were unaffected – in fact the number of players swelled to over 3.5 million. Thanks to a new sponsorship deal with ITV soap Emmerdale, we are telling funded charities' stories to new audiences – in fact, it is estimated this reached 58% of people in the UK in 2020.

In the end, players raised nearly £156 million in 2020 – around £17 million more than in 2019. This means a total of over £600 million has been raised in the 15 years since our launch in Britain, funding more than 8,500 good causes. An impressive achievement we plan to build on in the years to come.

Our ambition to do even more received a massive boost in July when the new £50 million annual sales limit for charity lotteries finally came into force, replacing the outdated £10 million limit.

This significant reform in charity lottery law is the culmination of years of

campaigning, consultation and collaboration. Without the backing of charity partners, and notable cross-party support, our campaign for these changes would not have borne fruit.

In helping raise even more funds, we remain fully committed to making sure all players join in safely. This commitment, shared by the five sister Postcode Lotteries, was cemented this year with the formulation of a shared Code of Conduct for Responsible Play.

Also core to our values as a social business is promoting equality, diversity and inclusion in every aspect of our operations. This year we carried out a diversity audit to highlight what more we can do to ensure there are no barriers to joining the team, becoming a player or applying for a grant.

At the end of the year Annemiek Hoogenboom moved away from her role as country director to become the founding member of the newly formed Charity Advisory Committee. She is joined on the committee by other thought leaders and experts, who will help safeguard our mission and ensuring we continue to grow the impact of funds raised by our players.

Finally, as ever, our team is at the heart of our success. This year, everyone showed incredible resilience, adapting admirably to home working. Training and development continued online, and we even delivered our team day and annual Christmas Breakfast virtually. To all our team we would like to say a heartfelt thank you for keeping our passion and values alive during such challenging times.

Players of People's Postcode Lottery help make good things happen – in their communities and around the world. Every ticket sold brings essential funding for a range of good causes.

In 1989, Novamedia created the world's first Postcode Lottery in the Netherlands, with a simple but ambitious mission – to raise funds towards creating a fairer, greener, more sustainable world.

Since then, the format has grown from strength to strength. There are now lotteries in five countries – the Netherlands, Sweden, Britain, Germany and Norway – with around 13 million players between them.

Together, to date, these players have raised almost 11 billion euros for humanitarian and environmental charities around the world. Novamedia and the Postcode Lotteries' track record as a force for good is impressive – it was ranked the world's third biggest private charity donor and the second largest in Europe in 2019/20*.


Towards the end of 2020, Novamedia co-founder Boudewijn Poelmann stepped back from the running of the organisation, while People's Postcode Lottery country director Annemiek Hoogenboom announced she was stepping down from that role. Colleagues and charity leaders expressed their gratitude for her firm leadership, determination and unwavering sense of justice.


How it works

Players of People's Postcode Lottery subscribe with their postcode and pay £10 a month per subscription to be entered into 20 monthly draws. Every day of the month we announce winning postcodes. The funds raised go directly to charities and good causes, or are awarded by one of 20 independent, grant-giving Postcode Trusts, each with a particular focus.

A potted history: 15 years of growth

People's Postcode Lottery came to Britain in 2005 with a pilot project in north-east England. Since then, millions of players have joined from around Britain, and raised more than £600 million for thousands of charities.

A game changer for charity funding

In 2020 we celebrated a five-fold increase in the charity lottery sales limit, which hopefully paves the way for further reforms.

Legislation passed in March 2020 saw Britain's outdated £10 million limit for charity lottery annual sales increase five-fold – to £50 million – and the per-draw sales limit for charity lotteries increase from £4 million to £5 million.

These long-awaited and hard-fought reforms came into force towards the end of July. The result is a significant and very welcome boost to the amount of funding we can raise for charities.

The change in the law is the result of years of campaigning under our banner 'Let Us Do More', backed by many high-profile charities and politicians across the political spectrum.

The new limit means charity lotteries are able to raise more for good causes, as well as reduce administration time and cut bureaucracy. It means from 2021 we were able to transform and simplify our charity structure to just 20 Postcode Trusts through which our players' funds are raised and awarded to charities.

However, our ambition for reform does not end here. We will contribute to the UK Government's planned review of the impact of the changes, set for late summer 2021.

From there, we have our sights set on the next stage of the charity reform process, namely consultation on doubling the annual sales limit to £100 million – a further change that the Government have already said they are sympathetic to.

Extra funds for Covid and climate

WaterAid takes to the airwayes

Players of People's Postcode Lottery have supported WaterAid's work in sub-Saharan Africa to the tune of more than £16.5 million since 2013.

In Rwanda, 95% of people have no means to wash their hands with both soap and water. And 56% of schools lack clean water. Hygiene messaging in the time of Covid proved a real challenge here. A quarter of the population cannot read and few can afford a TV, so radio is the most popular medium for people get news and information.

This is why player-supported charity WaterAid partnered with Radio Ishingiro – the country's biggest community radio station – to convey hygiene advice to millions of listeners through a series of radio plays. Written and produced by young people from a remote part of the country, the engaging plays convey messages about the role of handwashing, sanitation and clean water in combating diseases like Covid.

This was a year like no other. While the Covid pandemic caused global crisis and uncertainty, the climate emergency continued to climb up the international agenda. People's Postcode Lottery stepped up to support communities and charities in tackling both challenges.

Riding out the Covid storm

The global pandemic brought unforeseen challenges and pressures for people and communities, and the charities who support them. Yet many of these charities adapted and innovated to meet changing circumstances and growing need.

Thanks to the flexible funding model, smaller supported organisations could redirect the funding they received to adapt rapidly and continue their vital services.

The £3 million Postcode Recovery Fund, awarded from Postcode Innovation Trust, launched in October, gave local community-based charities in Britain a chance to apply for between £500,000 and £1 million toward high-impact projects to tackle issues exacerbated by the pandemic: educational inequalities, homelessness, domestic violence, health and wellbeing, poverty, social exclusion and isolation.

Bolstering the climate fight

At People's Postcode Lottery, we have a long-standing commitment to help raise funds for charities and good causes working to ensure a greener, more sustainable world. Climate change is now acknowledged to be the greatest global threat of our time, requiring urgent, decisive action. Our bold response is the Postcode Climate Challenge initiative, announced in November.

The Challenge commits more than £24 million in player raised funding to directly support 12 climate action projects by leading charities including The Wildlife Trusts, WWF-UK, Friends of the Earth, Fauna & Flora International, ClientEarth and Greenpeace. The Postcode Climate Challenge also encourages players, and our own team, to get involved in one small challenge each month to help the environment and raise awareness of how everyday choices impact the planet.

Honouring nature's hero

For over 60 years Sir David Attenborough has informed and inspired millions about the beauty and fragility of the natural world. In recognition of this work Sir David was named 2020's Postcode Hero and received an award of £500,000 for environmental charity Fauna & Flora International (FFI)*.

This funding, raised by players, will support the conservation charity's important work to stop biodiversity decline and protect the planet's threatened wildlife and habitats.

UK packaging innovator wins Green Challenge

The Postcode Lotteries Green Challenge is one of the world's largest annual sustainability awards. Hosted by the five sister lotteries, the challenge champions start-ups hoping to tackle pressing environmental challenges through a combination of sustainability, entrepreneurship and creativity.

The winner for 2020 and recipient of the €500,000 grand prize is alternative food packaging innovator SoluBlue (UK). Chosen from six finalists, it has created a biodegradable food packaging made of seaweed, which is breathable and less likely to result in 'sweaty' food.

The runner-up prize of €200,000 went to another UK-based start-up called Jiva, maker of the world's first recyclable, biodegradable printed circuit board (PCB) substrate.

The other four finalists were awarded at least €100,000 and a place on a bespoke accelerator programme. Over 650 start-ups from across Britain, the Netherlands, Sweden, Norway, and Germany applied to this year's Postcode Lotteries Green Challenge.

A decade of dreams

This year the Dream Fund celebrated its tenth anniversary. The fund challenges ambitious charities to think big, be bold and innovate – it provides the chance to bring a dream project to life in partnership with others.

Since the Dream Fund launched in 2010, 32 winners have been awarded a total of more than £16 million. The size of the funding pot has expanded every year, from £350,000 in its first year to a whopping £4 million in 2020. And the size of the awards has grown substantially too since the first £98,000 was awarded.

Funding for 2020's Dream Fund projects were awarded from Postcode Dream Trust.

Wilder Blean

£1.1 million Dream Fund award in 2020

Bison are coming to West Blean Wood near Canterbury in Kent. As part of an ambitious woodland wilding project led by Kent Wildlife Trust, Europe's largest land animal will be reintroduced to Britain for the first time since going extinct here thousands of years ago.

Bison are ecosystem engineers – their grazing naturally improves habitats for other species and acts as an alternative to management by humans. The bison at West Blean will create a public attraction too, and the hope is to replicate the project at other sites across the country.

The UK's first House for Healing will help child victims and witnesses get justice, recover, heal and move on.



£1.5 million Dream Fund award in 2020

This ambitious partnership between Children 1st, Victim Support Scotland, Children England and the University of Edinburgh hopes to radically transform the way children give evidence in criminal cases.

The first House for Healing, in the west of Scotland, will see children attend a homely, supportive space instead of the courtroom, providing a less intimidating way to give evidence. Here they will also get dedicated support to help them recover from trauma. It is hoped the pilot will provide the catalyst for revolutionising children's experience of the justice system.

Wild Oysters

£1.1 million Dream Fund award in 2020

Since the mid-1800s, native oyster numbers have declined by 95% due to over-harvesting, habitat loss, pollution and disease.

This project, by the Zoological Society of London (ZSL), Blue Marine Foundation and British Marine, hopes to restore native oyster populations in three areas around Britain. Healthy oyster beds mean cleaner water, abundant fish and shellfish and richer biodiversity. The project will also reignite public affinity to the native oyster through schools and community outreach.

Building stronger communities

Our players support a huge variety of charities and good causes – large and small, humanitarian and environmental, locally and internationally. Here is a flavour of the range of transformational work made possible by these funds over the last 12 months.


Tackling loneliness across the generations

Funded charity: NSPCC £5.9 million since 2013

The Silver Line has received £2.7 million since 2016
People's Postcode Lottery managed lotteries for NSPCC
Funding awarded to The Silver Line from Postcode Support Trust

In June, campaigner and broadcaster Dame Esther Rantzen called for generations to come together to fight loneliness after research by People's Postcode Lottery, with funded charities Childline (NSPCC) and The Silver Line, revealed that loneliness affects people at both ends of the age spectrum, and many are reluctant to talk about it.

Almost two-thirds of young people aged 16 to 24 feel lonely at least once a week, with many embarrassed to say so. And eight out of ten people over 75 who regularly feel lonely say they never tell anyone about it. Founded by Dame Esther, Childline and The Silver Line offer phone support services for those feeling isolated and alone.

Banking on the future of trees

Funded charity: Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew £2.4 million since 2013

Funding awarded from Postcode Earth Trust

Sir David Attenborough calls it "perhaps the most significant conservation initiative ever". The Millennium Seed Bank Partnership aims to safeguard the world's plant diversity by storing billions of seeds sub-zero vaults. As part of the initiative, Kew Gardens started the UK National Tree Seed Project in 2013. This year the player-funded project reached a milestone of having collected over 13 million seeds from native trees across the UK.

Keeping breakfast going

Funded charity: Magic Breakfast £2.5 million in funding since 2013

Funding awarded from Postcode Children Trust

As many as 1.8 million UK school children are at risk of morning hunger, which can lead to poor concentration and behaviour. Player-funded children's food charity Magic Breakfast is combating this by providing free breakfasts to over 48,000 children in 480 partner schools across the country.

During lockdown school closures, the charity's Keeping Breakfast Going emergency campaign continued to provide breakfasts – as home deliveries and take-home food packs – to children would normally support in school, ensuring none of them go hungry.

Dance for better living

Funded charity: English National Ballet £17,585 awarded in 2020 from Postcode Community Trust

Parkinson's Disease can have a devastating effect on quality of life. The project Dance for Parkinson's, run by English National Ballet (ENB), uses movement and dance to help people with the condition to live well.

As well as relieving physical symptoms, the highquality dance classes – inspired by ENB's repertoire – help improve mental wellbeing and selfconfidence. With player funding, these classes were rolled out around the country, including in London, Liverpool, Ipswich and Cardiff.

Medal for animal hero

Funded charity: APOPO £4.4 million in funding since 2014 Funding awarded from Portrodo Planet Trust

In September, Magawa, a giant African pouched rat, was awarded a PDSA gold medal for his "lifesaving bravery and devotion to duty".

Magawa was trained to detect landmines by player-funded charity APOPO and has cleared more than 141,000 square metres of land – the equivalent of 20 football pitches – making it the charity's most successful Hero Rat. He was presented with a miniature PDSA Gold Medal, the animal equivalent of the George Cross.

Peer support for cancer dads

Funded charity: CLIC Sargent £11.6 million since 2016

People's Postcode Lottery managed lotteries for CLIC Sargent

The dads of children with cancer can often feel very isolated and alone. National children's cancer charity CLIC Sargent, funded by players since 2016, is working to change this with its fathers' peer support group called Mind The Chaps!

The group gives fathers a space to talk freely and share their feelings with other men and dads in similar circumstances. During 2020, the group continued to meet online, and chatted with People's Postcode Lottery ambassador Jeff Brazier about their experiences and feelings.

Empowering girls in an online world

Funded charity: Girlguiding £7.2 million funding since 2014

People's Postcode Lottery managed lotteries for Girlquiding.

In September, Girlguiding published results of its Girls' Attitudes Survey, revealing the detrimental impact of online peer pressure on the wellbeing of girls and young women.

The survey showed that just under half of girls and young women regularly use apps or filters to enhance photos of themselves on social media. Over half said they have seen online adverts that have made them feel pressured to look different. And 80% revealed they had considered changing how they look.

Through its range of activities and programmes, Girlguiding continues to support girls and young women in the face of online pressures by providing an empowering girl-only space for its members.

Sing-alongs and smiles

Funded charity: Golden Oldies £13,000 awarded in 2020 from Postcode Community Trust

The charity affectionately known as Goldies brings socially isolated older people together through a love of favourite songs. Its Sing & Smile sessions take place in venues across England and Wales, and the charity also supports those with dementia and additional learning needs.

In summer 2020, uplifting footage from a session in a Bristol pub was beamed into homes around the country during the advert breaks of popular soap Emmerdale, which is sponsored by People's Postcode Lottery.

Sounds of a new generation

Funded charity: Youth Music £7.2 million funding since 2013

People's Postcode Lottery managed lotteries for Youth Music

In November, charity Youth Music announced the 31 music initiatives to receive funding from the first round of its £2 million Incubator Fund, thanks to players of People's Postcode Lottery.

The Incubator Fund aims to tackle industry inequality by improving access to sustainable music careers for 18-25-year-olds. The recipient initiatives, many of whom were hard hit by the pandemic, include a breakout radio station, a youth record label and a jazz group training black women in behind-the-scenes music roles.

Soap sponsorship spotlights charities

The incredible work of player-funded

charities around Britain is now being showcased daily to millions of primetime soap opera viewers, thanks to a highprofile new media partnership deal.

Announced in March 2020, People's Postcode Lottery's sponsorship of the popular ITV soap Emmerdale sees a range of community initiatives being spotlighted – from a kayak search and rescue team in Warwickshire to a children's clothing charity in

The show attracts more than six million viewers, so this is a wonderful way to raise awareness and reach potential new players, hopefully resulting in even more funding for good causes. It is estimated that we reached around 58% of the UK population in 2020 thanks to the sponsorship deal.

Players and winners

Almost four million people across Britain are now raising vital funds for charity by playing People's Postcode Lottery. And every day, a good number of these players celebrate a win.

In 2020, over 82% of players won and a total of over £193 million in prize money was paid out to winners in postcodes across England, Scotland and Wales. Prizes usually range from £10 to £30,000, up to a share of the monthly £3 million Postcode Millions prize.

Covid restrictions meant ambassadors were not knocking on doors or ringing bells as much as usual, but delivered the good news via video calls to delighted players everywhere.

£3 million win for islanders

January's Postcode Millions draw, held on behalf of Postcode Animal Trust, saw 101 residents of the Hebridean islands of North Uist and Berneray share a cool £3 million. Two neighbours in the full winning postcode received £193,055 each, while the remaining 99 residents won between £21,425 and £64,275.

Bumper wins in December

December was the single biggest prize month in People's Postcode Lottery history, with £22 million going to winners. The month brought the largest ever Postcode Millions prize – a whopping £4.1 million. Held on behalf of Postcode Active Trust, the draw saw the prize pot shared among 170 people in Hungerford's RG7 7 postcode sector. Those with tickets in the full winning postcode won £476,571 each.

December also featured our '£50K a Day' campaign, in which one winning postcode was announced every day, and each ticket in that postcode received £50,000. The total prize pot for this campaign was £7,150,000.

Spotlight on diversity

Fostering a culture of equality, diversity and inclusion is core to the People's Postcode Lottery ethos.

This year, we undertook a diversity audit to better understand our strengths in this regard and, more importantly, the changes needed to make our organisation even more inclusive – so that there are no barriers to someone joining the team, becoming a player or applying for funding.

Following the audit, we now have set of eight commitments to implement – these form part of our 2021 business objectives. All departments will also set their own commitment to equality, diversity and inclusion.

The eight commitments are to:

- 1. Introduce training on diversity, inclusion and unconscious bias for all team members
- 2. Review our recruitment policy, processes and partners
- 3. Increase awareness of funding opportunities to underrepresented groups
- 4. Collect and monitor team diversity data to support internal benchmarking and actions
- 5. Champion diversity and inclusion in all aspects of the business and recruit volunteer Diversity and Inclusion Champions in each department
- Review all media, marketing collateral and channels to ensure inclusive imagery and language
- 7. Consider how we make our team events and celebrations as inclusive as possible
- 8. Regularly communicate, request feedback and share how we are doing

Code of conduct for safe play

In 2020, public affairs representatives from Novamedia's five sister lotteries put their heads together to draw up a new seven-point Code of Conduct for Responsible Play, which outlines a shared commitment to protect potentially vulnerable players.

Though lotteries are considered low risk compared to other forms of gambling – as well as helping raise funds for good causes – the sister lotteries continually strive to make sure play is as safe as possible. The code captures seven agreed principles we commit to, despite cultural and regulatory differences across the countries. It shares best practice and serves as a baseline for any new Postcode Lotteries in the future.

New life for our old IT kit

As an organisation reliant on information technology, we recognise that e-waste is a growing yet under-reported problem. To tackle it, we have partnered with the Leith E-Waste and Education Hub (run by the social enterprise Edinburgh Remakery), to give all our retired IT equipment a new lease of life.

The initiative trains people who are jobless to refurbish donated equipment, which is then supplied to small businesses and charities that need kit. By donating our unwanted IT equipment, we are tackling e-waste, fostering a culture of repair and reuse, as well as supporting skills development.
